Ana Van Der Ree is an economist at the World Inequality Lab focused on updating and maintaining the World Inequality Database. Her research interests span across development economics, labour markets, inequality, and firm dynamics. She holds a masters from University of Oxford in development economics and a degree in economics from London School of Economics.

Welcome by WIL co-directors



Lucas Chancel is co-director of the World Inequality Lab and Associate Professor of Economics with tenure at Sciences Po, where he is based at the Centre de Recherche sur les Inégalités Sociales and the Department of Economics. He is also Senior Adviser to the International Tax Observatory. His research focuses on economic inequality, climate change, and the distributional dimensions of the energy transition. He is the author of *Unsustainable Inequalities* (Harvard University Press, 2020) and *Énergie et inégalités : Une histoire politique* (Le Seuil, 2025). He was most recently nominated for the 2026 Best Young Economist Award, awarded by Le Monde and Le Cercle des économistes.



Rowaida Moshrif is Co-Director and Head of Data at the World Inequality Lab. Her research focuses on historical political economy, land inequality, and elite dynamics in the Middle East, particularly Egypt. She has held research visits at the London School of Economics and Political Science and Universidad Carlos III de Madrid.



Thomas Piketty is Professor of Economics and Economic History at the École des hautes études en sciences sociales (EHESS) and the Paris School of Economics. His research lies at the intersection of historical political economy and socio-economic history, with a focus on economic development, the distribution of income and wealth, and political conflict. He is co-director of the WIL, and one of the initiators of the Global Justice Project. He is the author of *Capital in the Twenty-First Century* (HUP, 2014), *Capital and Ideology* (HUP, 2020), *A Brief History of Equality* (HUP, 2022), and with Julia Cagé of *A History of Political Conflict* (HUP, 2025).

Cornelia Mohren is Environmental Coordinator at the World Inequality Lab. She is the main author of the 2025 Climate Inequality Report. Her research focuses on the evolution of global inequality and its links to the climate crisis, with particular attention to the social impacts of environmental policy at both the local and global levels. She holds a Master's degree in Analysis and Policy in Economics from the Paris School of Economics.



Moritz Odersky is a Research Fellow at the World Inequality Lab. His research focuses on global inequality, climate change, and long-run development, with recent work on global wealth patterns, structural transformation, and the interaction between inequality and planetary limits. He is co-author of recent World Inequality Lab working papers including *Prosperity Within Limits? Planetary Habitability, Global Convergence and Structural Transformation, 2026-2100* and *Global Wealth Accumulation and Ownership Patterns, 1800–2025*.



Anmol Somanchi is Global Justice Coordinator at the World Inequality Lab. His research interests span labour economics, development economics, and inequality studies, with a particular focus on employer market power and social protection. He holds degrees from St. Stephen's College, the Tata Institute of Social Sciences, and the Paris School of Economics, and has previously worked with IDinsight, Research for Action, the Indian Institute of Management Ahmedabad.

Speakers



Jason Hickel is a political economist and Research Professor at the Institute of Environmental Science and Technology at the Autonomous University of Barcelona. His work focuses on global inequality, ecological economics, and post-growth futures. He is the author of *The Divide: A Brief Guide to Global Inequality and its Solutions* (William Heinemann, 2017) and *Less is More: How Degrowth Will Save the World* (William Heinemann, 2020), both widely recognised contributions to debates on inequality and sustainability. He serves on the Climate and Macroeconomics Roundtable of the US National Academy of Sciences and currently holds an ERC Synergy Grant exploring pathways for radical climate mitigation, economic democracy, and post-capitalist transition.



Tejal Kanitkar is Associate Professor at the Indira Gandhi Institute of Development Research. A mechanical engineer by training, she has worked in the field of energy and climate studies since 2006. Her research focuses on the intersections of energy, development, and climate policy, bringing together perspectives from engineering, the natural sciences, and the social sciences. Her work examines the links between energy production, environmental constraints, and economic development, with a particular emphasis on equity and justice in the context of the climate crisis. She holds a PhD in Energy Science and Engineering from the Indian Institute of Technology Bombay.



Nicholas Stern is an IG Patel Professor of Economics and Government at London School of Economics and Political Science, Chair of the Grantham Research Institute on Climate Change and the Environment and the Global School of Sustainability. One of the world's leading economists on development and climate change, he is widely known for leading the landmark *Review on the Economics of Climate Change* (2006). He has previously served as Chief Economist and vice president at the World Bank and the European Bank for Reconstruction and Development (EBRD), and as President of the British Academy. A Fellow of the Royal Society, his work focuses on growth, public policy, sustainable development, and climate economics. His latest book is: *The Growth Story of the 21st Century: The economics and opportunities of climate action* (LSE Press, 2025).

Emma Agyemang is a freelance journalist, best known for her work as global tax correspondent at the Financial Times, where she covered UK and international tax policy, including cross-border reforms and wealth taxation. She was named Business Journalist of the Year at the Words by Women Awards (2019) and Best Personal Finance Journalist at the ADVFN Awards (2020). She holds degrees from the University of Cambridge and the University of London, and previously worked in museums, archives, publishing, and policy analysis.

Speakers



Sarah Perret is the Head of the Personal and Property Taxes Unit in the Tax Policy and Statistics Division of the OECD Centre for Tax Policy and Administration. Her role involves assessing countries' tax systems and providing guidance on tax reform. She has been leading the OECD's work on personal income and wealth taxation and is the author of numerous studies on taxation, inequality and inclusive growth. She holds degrees from the London School of Economics and Political Science and Sciences Po Paris.



Emmanuel Saez is Professor of Economics and Director of the Stone Center on Wealth and Income Inequality at the University of California Berkeley. He received his PhD in Economics from MIT in 1999. His research focuses on inequality and tax policy. Jointly with Thomas Piketty, he created the top income share series that shows a dramatic increase in US inequality since 1980. The data have been widely discussed in the public debate. His 2019 book "The Triumph of Injustice", joint with his colleague Gabriel Zucman, narrates the demise of US progressive taxation and how to reinvent it in the 21st century.



Gabriel Zucman is Professor of Economics at the Paris School of Economics and École normale supérieure–PSL, Research Professor at the University of California, Berkeley, founding Director of the International Tax Observatory, and founding Director of the James M. and Cathleen D. Stone Center on Wealth and Income Inequality at the University of California on Global Wealth Dynamics at PSE. A leading scholar of global wealth, taxation, and inequality, he is the author of the *The Hidden Wealth of Nations* (The University of Chicago Press, 2015) and *We Need to Tax Billionaires*. He was awarded the John Bates Clark Medal in 2023 and was elected Fellow of the Econometric Society in 2024.

Thomas Bézy is an economist at the Paris School of Economics and a Research Fellow at the World Inequality Lab. His research explores inequalities in housing and wealth, with a particular focus on how climate change and environmental risks affect property ownership, insurance coverage, and economic vulnerability.

Speakers



Jofre Carnicer is a Senior Researcher at CREAM and Professor of Ecology at the University of Barcelona. Since 2018, he has contributed to the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change, including as an author of the Sixth Assessment Report (2022), and is currently involved in the Seventh Assessment Report. His research focuses on the impacts of climate change on Mediterranean ecosystems, with particular attention to forest resilience, plant–animal interactions, and ecosystem services. He also serves on Spain’s National Climate Council and leads research on forest carbon sinks, drought regime shifts, and adaptation pathways under global warming.

Olivier De Schutter is a Belgian legal scholar and Professor of International Law at the Catholic University of Louvain, as well as at Sciences Po Paris. He served as the United Nations Special Rapporteur on the Right to Food from 2008 to 2014. He was then a member of the UN Committee on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights from 2015 until May 2020, before being appointed United Nations Special Rapporteur on Extreme Poverty and Human Rights. He is the recipient of the 2013 Francqui Prize and has held visiting appointments at Columbia University, University of California, Berkeley, and Yale University. He also coordinated the European Network of Independent Experts on Fundamental Rights from 2002 to 2007.



Céline Guivarch is a climate economist and Research Director at École des Ponts and International Center for Research on Environment and Development (CIRED). Trained as an engineer at École polytechnique and École des Ponts, and holding a doctorate in economics, her research combines climate science, economics, and applied mathematics to model the economic and social consequences of climate change. She is a member of France’s High Council for Climate and is a coordinating lead author of the IPCC Seventh Assessment Report. She received the Irène Joliot-Curie Young Woman Scientist Prize in 2020 for her interdisciplinary work on climate modelling and policy.

Speakers



Jean Drèze is a development economist whose work focuses on poverty, public policy, and social and economic rights, with particular reference to India. He completed his PhD at the Indian Statistical Institute in New Delhi and became an Indian citizen in 2002. He has taught at the London School of Economics and Political Science and the Delhi School of Economics, and is currently Visiting at Ranchi University. His recent books include *An Uncertain Glory: India and Its Contradictions* (Princeton University Press, 2013), written with Amartya Sen, and *Sense and Solidarity: Jholawala Economics for Everyone* (Oxford University Press, 2019).



Marc Fleurbaey is CNRS Senior Researcher, Professor at Paris School of Economics, and Associate Professor at ENS-Ulm. Author of *Beyond GDP* (with Didier Blanchet, OUP 2013), *A Theory of Fairness and Social Welfare* (with François Maniquet, CUP 2011), and *Fairness, Responsibility and Welfare* (OUP, 2008), he is a former editor of *Social Choice and Welfare* and *Economics and Philosophy* and is currently an associate editor of *Free & Equal*. He is one of the initiators of the International Panel on Social Progress, and lead author of its *Manifesto for Social Progress* (CUP 2018). He was a coordinating lead author for the IPCC 5th Report, a member of the United Nations Committee for Development Policy from 2016 to 2021.



Isabelle Ferreras is Research Director at the Belgian National Fund for Scientific Research (FNRS) and Professor of Sociology at UCLouvain. She is also a Senior Research Associate at the Harvard Center for Labor and a Just Economy and a Distinguished Research Fellow at the Oxford Institute for Ethics in AI. Her research focuses on work, economic democracy, and firms as political entities. Most recently, she chaired the International High-level Expert Committee on Democracy at Work appointed by the Spanish Government, which released a report promoting democracy at work in Spain and beyond (<https://reportondemocracyatwork.org/>). Her publications include *Firms as Political Entities* (Cambridge University Press, 2017), *Democratize Work* (University of Chicago Press, 2022), and *Democratizing the Corporation* (Verso, 2024). She also coordinates the global network www.DemocratizingWork.org.



Ingrid Robeyns is Professor of Ethics of Institutions at Utrecht University, affiliate professor at the Utrecht School of Economics, and visiting professor at the London School of Economics and Political Science. Her research focuses on political philosophy, applied ethics, social justice, and institutional change, with particular attention to inequality, and the ethics of wealth concentration. She is the author of *Limitarianism: The Case Against Extreme Wealth* (2024). She served as President of the Human Development and Capability Association from 2018 to 2020 and has been a member of the Royal Netherlands Academy of Arts and Sciences since 2018. In 2025, she received the Stevin Prize, the highest scholarly distinction in the Netherlands.

Mariana Mazzucato is Professor in the Economics of Innovation & Public Value at University College London (UCL) , where she is Founding Director of the UCL Institute for Innovation & Public Purpose (IIPP). Author of *The Entrepreneurial State: debunking public vs. private sector myths*, *The Value of Everything: making and taking in the global economy* and *Mission Economy: a moonshot guide to changing capitalism*, her forthcoming book *The Common Good Economy*, will be released on June 4 2026.

Speakers



David Adler is a political economist and Co-General Coordinator of Progressive International, the organisation founded in 2020 to unite and mobilise progressive forces around the world. He previously served on the foreign policy advisory team of Senator Bernie Sanders and directed policy for Yanis Varoufakis and Democracy in Europe Movement 2025 (DiEM25). A former Rhodes Scholar at the University of Oxford and Fulbright Scholar at El Colegio de México, his work focuses on internationalism, political movements, and global institutions. His writing has appeared in *The New York Times*, *The Guardian*, *The Washington Post*, and *Foreign Affairs*.



Paula Druschke is an Economist at the World Inequality Lab, where she studies the political economy of international institutions and global inequality. She is also a predoctoral research assistant at the London School of Economics, working with Camille Landais on the Child Penalty Atlas. She holds dual Master's degrees in the Political Economy of Development from Sciences Po and LSE. Her research interests lie at the intersection of geoeconomics, public economics, and development economics. She is co-author of the recent World Inequality Lab working paper *The Global Democratic Deficit: Institutional Asymmetries and the Provision of Global Public Goods*.



Jayati Ghosh is Professor of Economics and Research Associate at the Political Economy Research Institute at the University of Massachusetts Amherst. She previously taught at Jawaharlal Nehru University in New Delhi. Her work focuses on development economics, inequality, gender, labour, and macroeconomic policy, with particular attention to the Global South. She is the author and editor of numerous books and articles, including *The making of a catastrophe: The Covid-19 pandemic and the Indian economy* (Aleph Book Company), and has advised international organisations including the United Nations, the International Labour Organization, and the World Health Organization.



Marie-Yemta Moussanang is an independent researcher, consultant, entrepreneur and teacher at Sciences Po Paris. Her areas of interest are critical theories of Modernity, post-development, popular economies and non-wage social protection. Since 2019, she has produced the podcast Afrotopiques which addresses major contemporary issues from the perspective of contemporary African societies. She works between Paris, Dakar and N'Djamena.



Gastón Nievas is an Economist at the Paris School of Economics and the National Accounts coordinator at the World Inequality Lab. He studies how globalization shapes inequality, focusing on why gaps between rich and poor countries persist and the power relations that sustain them. His work sits at the intersection of geoeconomics and international macroeconomics.

Julie Gonnet is Head of Gender, Equality and Inclusion Practices at the French Development Agency (AFD). She leads teams responsible for implementing AFD's strategy, mainstreaming these priorities across operations, and developing strategic partnerships. She also represents AFD in international fora and contributes to policy dialogue and advocacy. With over 20 years of experience in sustainable development and development finance, she has led projects across Africa, Latin America, Asia and Small Island States, with expertise in climate change and gender equality. She graduated from HEC Paris and holds an MSc in Environmental Management from SOAS, University of London.



Camille Landais is Professor of Economics at the London School of Economics and Political Science and Director of the Suntory and Toyota International Centres for Economics and Related Disciplines. His research focuses on public finance and labour economics, with work published in leading journals including the American Economic Review and the Quarterly Journal of Economics. He is affiliated with the Institute for Fiscal Studies, IZA, and the Institut des politiques publiques, and serves on the council of the European Economic Association. He is also co-author, with Thomas Piketty and Emmanuel Saez, of *Pour une révolution fiscale* (Seuil, 2011).



Anne-Sophie Robilliard is Research Director at the Institut de recherche pour le développement (IRD) and West and Central Africa Coordinator at the World Inequality Lab. Her research focuses on developing countries, particularly in Sub-Saharan Africa, with work on poverty, inequality, gender, labour markets, and the distributive impact of public policies. Using household-level microeconomic data and microsimulation methods, she studies the determinants of inequality and evaluates the effects of fiscal and social policies. She also teaches microsimulation and public policy evaluation at the Paris School of Economics and Paris Dauphine University.

Amory Gethin is a researcher in the World Bank Development Research Group and Political Cleavages and Redistribution Coordinator at the World Inequality Lab, where he maintains the World Political Cleavages and Inequality Database. He completed his PhD in 2024. His research focuses on long-run transformations in the global economy, including poverty reduction, the role of public policy in shaping growth and inequality, and the dynamics of political conflict in contemporary democracies.

Grace Blakeley is a socialist author and economic commentator. Her most recent book is *"Vulture Capitalism: Corporate Crimes, Backdoor Bailouts and the Death of Freedom"*, which was longlisted for the 2025 Women's Prize for Nonfiction, and won the 2025 Ellen Meiksins Wood prize. She is the former economics commentator for the New Statesman, and a former Research Fellow at the Institute of Public Policy Research.



Julia Cagé is a Professor of Economics in the Department of Economics at Sciences Po Paris, and a Research Fellow at the Center for Economic Policy Research (CEPR), where she is leading the Research and Policy Network on “Media Plurality”. She is also a Research Fellow at the CESifo Research Network and at the World Inequality Lab. She is the author of *The Price of Democracy. How Money Shapes Politics and What to Do about It* (HUP, 2020), and *A History of Political Conflict. Elections and Social Inequalities in France, 1789-2022* (HUP, 2025), joint with Thomas Piketty.



Dena Freeman is an anthropologist and Professor of Global Studies at Shanghai University, and a Visiting Senior Fellow in Anthropology at the LSE. Describing herself as an “anthropologist of globalization,” her work combines anthropology, political economy, and global history to analyse the world as a single social system and explore more just forms of global organisation and progressive change. Her latest book, *The Global Left in a Multipolar World: Towards a Planetary Politics of Justice and Survival* (Routledge, 2026), examines how transformative left politics can advance in the context of a multipolar order and the climate crisis, and will be available [open access in early June](#).



Don Kalb is professor social anthropology at the University of Bergen, academic director of the GRIP program on global inequality at UiB, and founding editor of *Focaal - Journal of Global and Historical Anthropology*. Post-socialism is one of his specialty areas. Don's recent books: *Value and Worthlessness: The Rise of the Populist Right and Other Disruptions in the Anthropology of Capitalism* (2025), and (with Walden Bello, eds) *Backlash: The Global Rise of the Radical Right* (2026).

Branko Milanović is a Research Professor at the Graduate Center *City University of New York*. His work focuses on income inequality within countries and at the global level, including its historical evolution. He is the author of *Global Inequality, Capitalism, Alone, and Visions of Inequality*, and was awarded the Leontief Prize in 2018 jointly with Mariana Mazzucato.

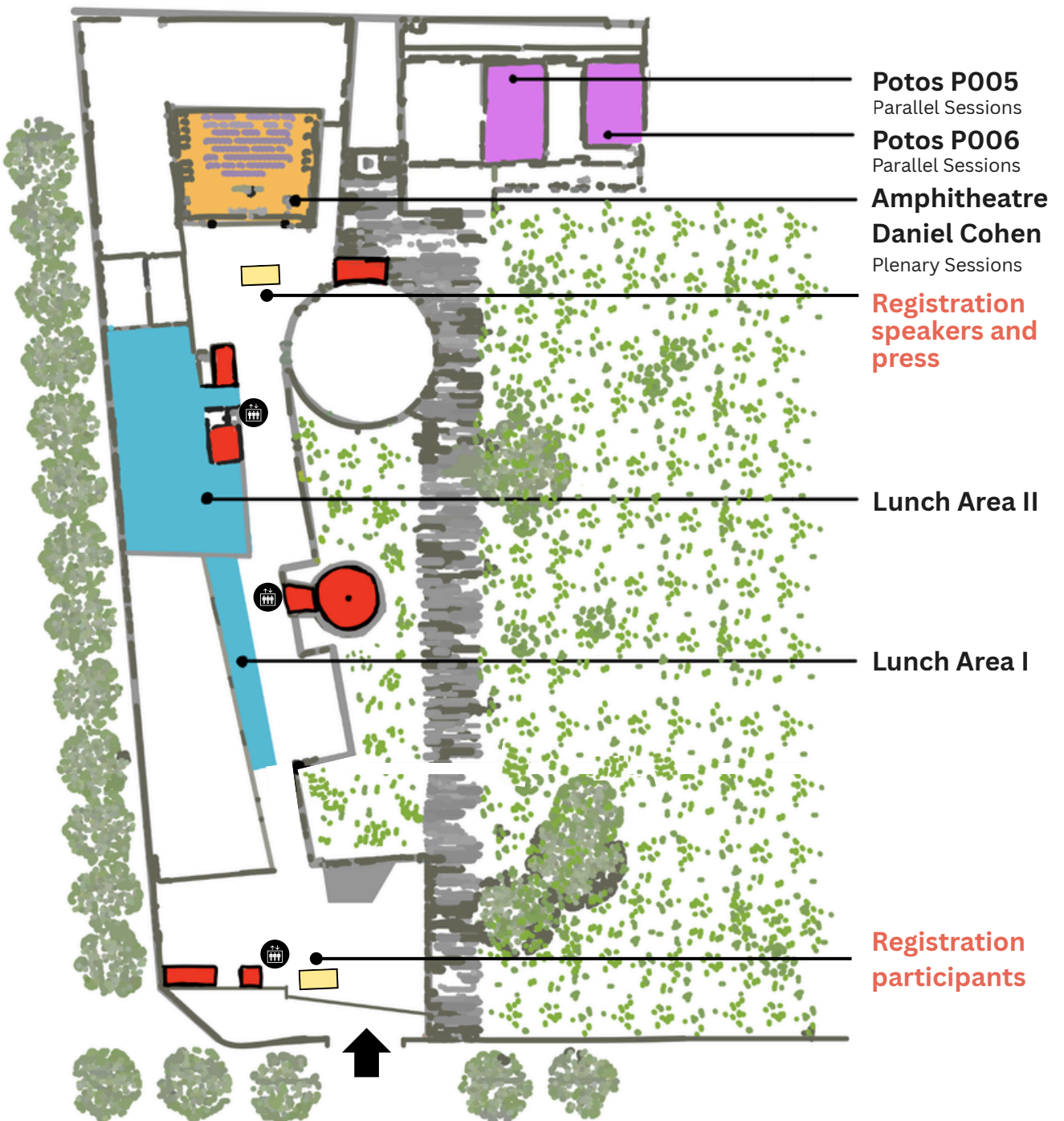

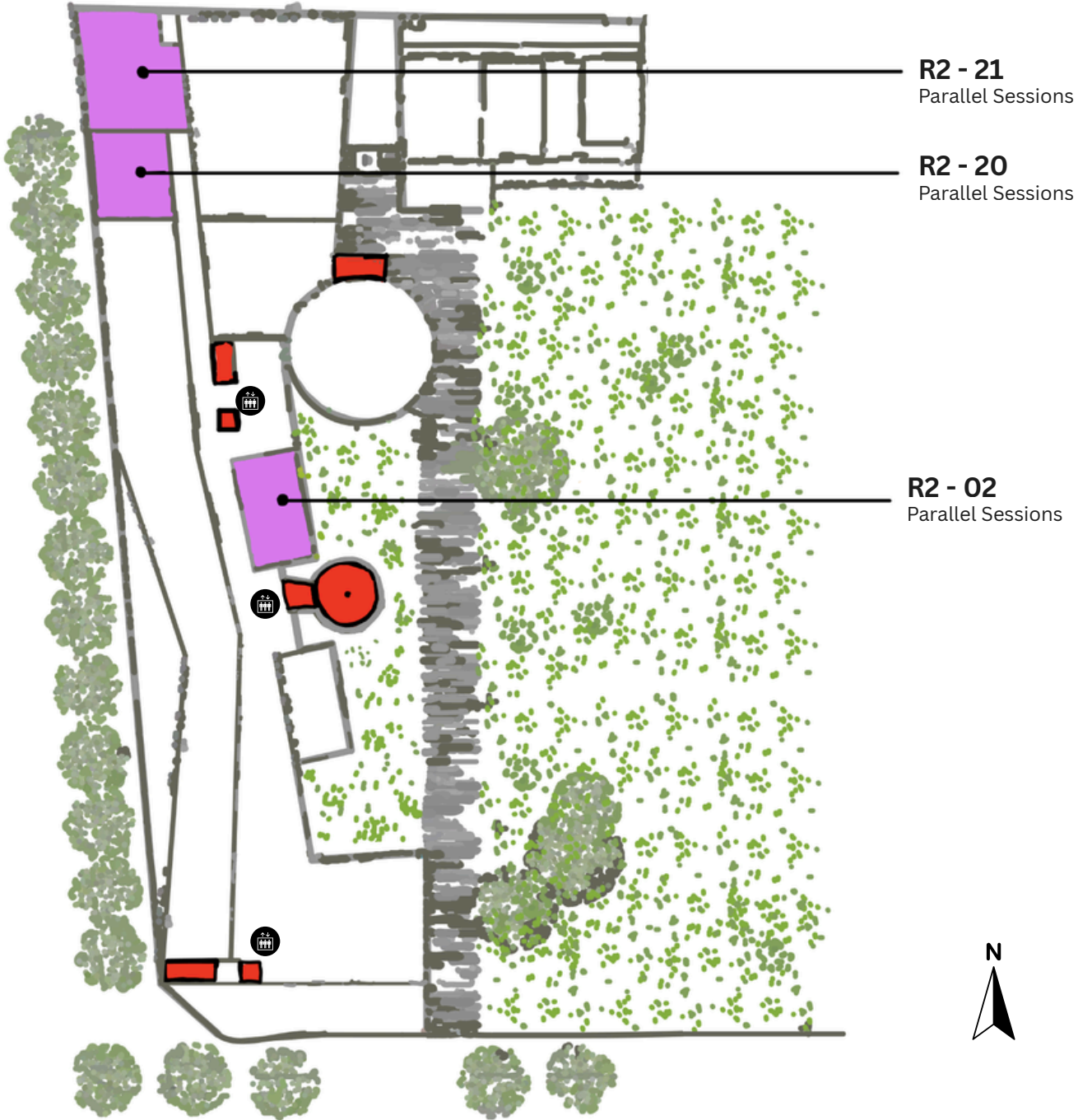
